**ITALIAN NAVY RESCUES 233 MIGRANTS FROM MEDITERRANEAN BOAT**

(CNN) -- More than 200 migrants have been rescued from an overcrowded boat at risk of sinking in rough waters in the Mediterranean Sea, the Italian navy said Thursday. The alarm was raised on the evening of New Year's Day, when the boat was spotted about 80 miles south of the Italian island of Lampedusa.

The boat, which measured only 10 meters (33 feet) long, was carrying 233 people without life jackets, the navy statement said. Given the rough seas and the boat's "precarious state of buoyancy," the decision was made to transfer the 233 people, seven of them women, to a navy ship, the San Marco. All were safely recovered, the statement said. The migrants, from Eritrea, Nigeria, Somalia, Pakistan, Zambia and Mali, were all moved safely, the statement said. After being transferred to a frigate, the migrants

will be taken to the port of Augusta, on the Italian island of Sicily, where they are expected to arrive Thursday evening, it said.

Meanwhile, the Greek coast guard has rescued 85 migrants -- including 15 children and 20 women -- after their boat got into trouble in stormy weather in the southeastern Aegean Sea. They were taken to a port on the Aegean island of Astypalea, where they arrived Thursday, the coast guard said. They are being given medical help, food and other emergency supplies, the coast guard said. Greece's semiofficial Macedonian News Agency reported that the migrants are Syrians and Afghans, but the coast guard has not yet confirmed their nationality.

**Sea of Death**

As the closest Italian island to Africa, Lampedusa is a frequent destination for refugees seeking to enter

European Union countries, and shipwrecks off its shores are common. Many of the migrants are from African nations, while others have fled war-torn Syria. More than 300 African migrants died in October after their ship sank off the island's shores. Days later, another 34 people died when their boat capsized.

Tens of thousands of people are rescued each year from the Mediterranean, according to the European Union border agency, Frontex. Smugglers often pack migrants into unseaworthy, ill-equipped and overcrowded boats, adding to the dangers of the journey.

Between January and September of last year, 31,000 migrants are believed to have entered the European Union illegally by crossing the Mediterranean to land on Italian soil or the island of Malta, Frontex said.

The United Kingdom and Denmark do not use the euro, and are not required to be a part of the eurozone. Public opinion polls in the UK have shown opposition as high as 75% to adopting the euro.

Sweden does not belong to the eurozone but must join in the future, according to the terms of the treaty.

Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Hungary, Lithuania, Poland, and Romania belong to the EU, but do not currently meet the criteria for joining the eurozone.

## SEEDORF MAKES 'EMOTIONAL' MILAN RETURN

Clarence Seedorf arrived in Italy on Wednesday evening to a hero's welcome ahead of his official unveiling as AC Milan's new coach. The Rossoneri were leading Spezia 3-0 when the biggest applause of the night was reserved for the new boss.

The Dutchman made his return to the San Siro following a transatlantic flight which saw him not only cross several time zones, but also make the transition from footballer to coach. He arrived in Milan's Linate airport to be immediately surrounded by hordes of fans and reporters, pronouncing his first words as new Milan boss. "I'm very emotional and feel a sense of duty," the 37-year-old told reporters. "I left Milan in May 2012, closing a cycle. My job now is to reopen another one."

Milan are languishing in 11th place in Serie A, 10 points adrift of the top five and a place in Europe next season. He could therefore have a lot to thank caretaker Mauro Tassotti for with the Coppa Italia perhaps offering the easiest route into Europe next season -- Wednesday night's 3-1 win set up a quarterfinal tie with Udinese. Tassotti kept the bench warm for just the one game following Massimiliano Allegri's dismissal on Monday. Seedorf will take his place against Hellas Verona on Sunday night. "We've got a lot of hard work ahead to take Milan back to the top again," Seedorf said. "I'm

delighted. Two years ago, president [Silvio] Berlusconi predicted everything. It can't be said that I've come back because I never truly left. To see all of this enthusiasm is crucial for me."

He was given a warm embrace by the club's general manager, Adriano Galliani, on his arrival at the San Siro, as the pair resumed their working relationship after little over 18 months of separation. Their paths had crossed only a few weeks ago in Brazil for what Galliani claimed was just a casual meeting. There, the first foundations were laid for Seedorf to become Milan coach in the summer. A 4-3 defeat to Sassuolo on Sunday night meant Milan could no longer wait that long to make a change.

"We can aim to do great things for the fans," Seedorf said to Milan Channel at the San Siro. "I've got to give 100 percent to rebuild the squad and to give them enthusiasm and self-belief."

Apart from climbing Serie A during the second half of the season, Seedorf will also be looking to take the Rossoneri as far as they can in the Champions League, a competition he won twice for them as a player. Italy's only remaining club in that competition face Atletico Madrid in the last 16.

## THOHIR PLANNING TO RESHAPE INTER SQUAD

Inter Milan president Erick Thohir has laid out his plans to reduce the average age of the squad, even if it means severing ties with the "heroes of the treble" of 2010.

Speaking after a 1-1 draw with Chievo Verona that left Inter in fifth place in Serie A at the midway stage of the season, Thohir said his club must look to the future and stop dwelling on the past, although he has called for patience as he puts his plans into practice.

"It's going to be a difficult two or three years," he told Indonesian site Vivanews. "We want a healthy club and we've got to follow the example of English clubs where they are able to deal with their income in such a way that they manage to increase it, enabling them to buy great players.

"At the moment, we have too many players in certain positions and too few in others. We need to strike a balance. We need players aged between 24 and 26. That does not mean we do not appreciate the heroes of the treble, but obviously we need to insert some younger players into the squad."

For those younger players to

arrive, others will first have to leave. Out with the old and in with the new is the philosophy which places Inter in a brief moment of transition.

"We have a clear project," Thohir told Repubblica Online. "We want to build a healthy club which is competitive, and this year is a transitional one. We are not starting from scratch; it's the final year of a fantastic era. From next season, a new era will start."

## ALESSANDRO MATRI OUT TO PROVE A POINT

New Fiorentina signing Alessandro Matri says he only has himself to blame for his struggles at AC Milan, while he is determined to ensure things pan out differently with the Viola. Matri, 29, completed a move to the Florence club on loan until the end of the season on Wednesday. The striker was presented by Fiorentina at a news conference on Thursday, eager to prove he is not the same player seen by the fans at the San Siro during the first half of the season.

"I have a great desire to spark the engine back into life and show what I did up to last year," said Matri, who joined Milan from Juventus last summer. "I'm very self-critical so the blame is mainly mine and I have no problem admitting it. I'd like to thank Milan who made such an effort to get me. "They were an odd six months because I wanted to bounce

back after Juve, but exclusively due to my own problems in settling in, this decision has now come about for me to show, maybe with a bit more consistency, what my real worth is."


Matri has been drafted in to fill a void in the Fiorentina attack left by serious injuries to both Giuseppe Rossi and Mario Gomez. However, he has four months to prove he is worthy of a place in the side, even when both are fit again, and perhaps also to secure a return to the Italy national team. "My first objective is to do well here because that's crucially important," Matri said. "I've said it in the past: if I do well in the club I'm playing then there's always the chance to be called up [for Italy]. Being called up to the national team is what every player aims for, but my priority is what I do here.

"I am here on loan so, at the end of that term, both clubs will have a decision to make. It will depend on how I play and I'd like to think of the present because there's no sense in thinking of the past and the future. I am ready and I want to make my contribution immediately." Matri has moved from a side languishing in 11th in Serie A to one just five points adrift of a place in the Champions League next season.

"We've got to believe that we can qualify for the Champions League," he said. "We're very close to third place and there is motivation at least to give it a go. Fiorentina have surprised me a lot over the past few years, to be honest.

## ITALIAN IOC MEMBER MARIO PESCANTE CRITICIZES US FOR INCLUDING GAY ATHLETES IN SOCHI DELEGATION

ROME - A senior Italian IOC member criticized the United States on Wednesday for including openly gay athletes in its official delegation for next month's Sochi Olympics.

"It's absurd that a country like that sends four lesbians to Russia just to demonstrate that in their country gay rights have (been established)," Mario Pescante said at an Italian Olympic Committee meeting in Milan on Wednesday, in comments widely reported by Italian media. "The games should not be an occasion and a stage to promote rights that sports supports daily."

The Italian Olympic Committee would not confirm or deny Pescante's comments, but his speech was reported by the Gazzetta dello Sport and the ANSA news agency. Asked for clarification later by The Associated Press, Pescante said he

is not against gays. "Of course not," the 75-year-old Pescante told The AP by telephone. "I just wanted to make the point not to let politics interfere with the Olympics."

For the first time since 2000, the U.S. delegation to the Olympics will not include a president, vice-president or first lady. President Obama is sending three openly gay athletes — tennis great Billie Jean King, figure skater Brian Boitano and hockey player Caitlin Cahow. The naming of the U.S. delegation followed a furious backlash in the West over the Russian law banning gay "propaganda," which has tarnished Russia's international reputation heading into the games.

As head of the IOC's International Relations Commission and a former IOC vice-president, Pescante said he will put forth a proposal at the IOC

session in Sochi so that in the future when the Olympic truce is signed at the United Nations it also will have a section devoted to political protests. "We've seen boycotts, concerns over Aborigine rights in Australia, the Tibet issue in China. It's enough already," Pescante told The AP.

"There are always going to be issues wherever the games are held, but the best way to combat these issues is by letting the games unfold and sending thousands of journalists to these places to report on what is going on there."

Pescante was the Italian government's supervisor for the 2006 Turin Games. Among his accomplishments he has brokered peace talks between Israeli and Palestinian Olympic officials over the past few years.

## ITALIAN FARMERS FIGHT BACK AGAINST WOLVES

Italian farmers kill wolves and anonymously dump them in piazzas and along roads in silent protest against livestock deaths. Farmers in Italy have taken the law into their own hands in response to a boom in the number of wolves roaming the country, illegally shooting the predators and dumping them in towns and villages as a public reprisal for the death of livestock. The wolf was pushed to the verge of extinction in Italy by the 1970s, when the population dipped to just 100 individuals, but since then a ban on shooting, trapping and poisoning has achieved spectacular success, with numbers now estimated at around 1,000. The population is concentrated in the Alps and along the Apennines, the rugged spine of mountains which runs down the peninsula.

The barbaric backlash against the revival of the species has been particularly pronounced in Tuscany, where at least eight wolves have been illegally shot in the last two months. Another apparently strangled to death after being caught in an illegal snare. Many of the carcasses were dumped prominently in villages or by roadsides as part of an anonymous protest by farmers against what they regard as a grave threat to their flocks. One wolf was left in a piazza in the village of Scansano, in the Maremma region of Tuscany, a coastal area famed for its white cattle, marshes and Etruscan ruins.

A second body was found dumped in the village of Manciano, also in southern Tuscany, while the corpse of a two-year-old female wolf which had been shot dead was left by the side of a road leading to the town of Saturnia

in the same region a few days before Christmas. "The message was clear — we can stand this no longer. The wolves are slaughtering our sheep, so we're slaughtering the wolves," commented one Italian daily, lending a sinister Mafia-style note to the story and fuelling anti-wolf fever. Farmers say they are having their livelihoods ruined by regular wolf raids. "Wolves attacked my animals three times just in December," said Franco Mattei, a sheep farmer. "The first time, I came across a sheep which had been disembowelled. Another two had just disappeared. On the third occasion I killed the wolf — it was the day before New Year's Eve," he said.

"When sheep are attacked they are blinded with fear and run off, sometimes falling into ravines or ditches." Farmers can apply for government funds to erect electric fences around their flocks, but these have only limited success against a predator as determined and intelligent as the wolf. "Farmers who find their sheep fold devastated want an immediate response. And if that response is not forthcoming, then they take the law into their own hands," said Enzo Rossi, an agricultural official in the province of Grosseto in Tuscany. The killing of wolves by farmers has been strongly condemned by environmental groups.

"The discovery of these carcasses should seriously concern all those tasked with managing and protecting the wildlife heritage of our country," said Dante Caserta, from the Italian branch of the World Wide Fund for Nature. The wolf was protected by European Union and Italian legislation and by killing them, landowners had show "contempt" for the law, he said.

Conservationists believe that many of the sheep and other livestock being killed are in fact the victims of feral dogs or wolf half-breeds, rather than full-blood wolves. Farmers who lose livestock to wolves can apply for compensation from the government, with the price of a sheep set at between 150 and 180 euros, depending on its age.

But landowners complain that it often takes five or six months for the payments to be made. Coldiretti, a national organisation representing farmers, said that the return of the wolf and other large mammals such as the brown bear, was a welcome development but that farmers needed prompt and adequate compensation.

"It shouldn't be just farmers who pay the price of predators living together with domestic livestock," said the organisation's Stefano Masini. Aside from the ban on hunting and poisoning, the return of the wolf in Italy has been helped by the depopulation of the countryside, leaving vast tracts of hill country to return to scrub and forest, and the consequent increase in prey species like wild boar and deer.

Wolves in Italy are now spreading across the border into France, where they have caused a similar outcry among farmers. Across Europe, the wolf population quadrupled between 1970 and 2005, according to a study released in September by Rewilding Europe, a conservation organisation which wants to return a million hectares of land to its natural state and bring back some of the continent's most emblematic species.
